

At the Theatre, 1928, is one of the most compelling and dramatic paintings in the history of Canadian art. Montreal-based artist Prudence Heward (1896–1947) put women front and centre in her vibrant compositions, portraying them as modern, independent participants in city life. Almost a century later, we are delighted to be sharing a growing library of educational resources featuring Canadian women artists like Heward to open learning gateways to a diversity of topics. As we celebrate these barrier-breaking women, we're also reflecting on the upcoming National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women, honouring those who are no longer with us and re-committing to a safe and equal place for all women in Canada. Prudence Heward was best known for vibrant, modern portraits of strong and independent female subjects. She was one of the famed Beaver Hall artists, a group working in Montreal who claimed a historic number of women as affiliates, and her paintings captured the spirit of some of the seismic shifts occurring for women in the early twentieth century. Our Independent Student Learning Activity "Design a Social Media Campaign for the Interwar Era" invites students to explore the history of women's rights in this country through a creative project inspired by the media of the present.

MARY PRATT AND CHALLENGES TO FEMINISM

Looking for strategies to introduce your students to the topic of second-wave feminism? The stunning works produced by Newfoundland painter Mary Pratt (1935-2018) offer an interesting starting point. Though Pratt herself was a little ambivalent about being labeled a feminist icon, her immaculately rendered images of the domestic sphere spark conversations about issues that were at the forefront of feminism in the 1960s and 1970s, such as gender roles, family life, and career ambitions. Gather around Pratt's *Supper Table* with your students to lead them in a thinking routine about feminism in Canada.

SHUVINAI ASHOONA RE-IMAGINES THE WORLD

The vibrant works of contemporary Inuk artist Shuvinai Ashoona (b.1961) invite us to consider creative pathways into re-imagining our world, with women at the forefront. A third-generation artist from Kinngait, Nunavut, Ashoona is part of a long-standing artistic legacy of Inuit women changing the landscape of contemporary art in Canada. In *Three Cousins*, 2005, this heritage is commemorated through an image of the artist standing with her cousins Siassie Kenneally (1969–2018) and Annie Pootoogook (1969–2016), as all three hold up their creations. Together, they have made an extraordinary contribution to Canadian art.

CHANGEMAKERS




